

September 2018- Boerne Fire Department Monthly Report

- The Boerne Fire Department responded to 81 incidents for the month of September 2018, compared to 77 incidents in September 2017.
- Fire Department members spent a total of 249.45 man hours responding to incidents within the City limits and 104.21 man hours responding to incidents outside the City limits, for a total of 353.66 hours responding to incidents in September 2018.
- Personnel spent 28 hours attending meetings and 205.5 hours in training sessions during the month of September 2018.
- Firefighters spent 33 hours participating in the Kendall County Fair Parade.
- Fire Department members have spent a total of 5339.36 hours since January 1, 2018 responding to incidents, attending meetings, attending training sessions and participating in extra activities.
